Baptist Pioneering, The Western Convention.
 Part II By Kelly Fekete

In 1867, a topic of concern for our forefathers was that **“all British possessions in North America should be united.”** **Second, what to name it? It’s unclear who,** but as they were looking upon a map showing the vast space between the Atlantic & Pacific Oceans the person is said to have quoted the following line **from Scripture. “And his Dominions shall be from sea to sea.”** **Hence on July 1, 1867, Canada became The Dominion of Canada.**

In 1869 Rev. R.A. Fyfe D.D. suggested an effort be made to send a Missionary to the **“North West”** and that a delegation comprised of Rev. T. Baldwin of Ingersall, and Rev. T.L. Davidson D.D. of Aylmer, go and explore & report on the conditions of the country and the possibility of establishing a Baptist Church or Churches. The small group including Dr. Fyfe of Perth, set forth June 16th 1869. The group made its way through the states via railway and on the 4th day reached St. Cloud, Minnesota. Then switching to mule and cart for 9 days made **their way by “Trader’s Trail” back to Canada** where they reported that **“we wrote “Canada” on the British side of Boundary Post** took off our hats and

awoke an awful stillness by **singing ‘God Save our Gracious Queen’ with full hearts”** **The first buildings** they came across were **“three long houses, thatched with mud and straw and is 60 miles from Winnipeg”.** All told, it took fourteen days and a distance of over fourteen hundred miles. The delegation reports that **“Winnipeg is a small town, consisting of about thirty log buildings, and one single brick structure”** which in **Rev. Baldwin’s letter he describes as “a drug store” and likens their group to “Spies”.** Dr. Baldwin also reports that **Dr. Davidson is “sick with the ague”**

The report outlines, climate, soil, political, religious, conditions and the labors of this group, all of course I cannot recount here. Throughout I am awe struck by their accounts at the vastness of the area they are exploring. Dr. Baldwin reports coming upon Portage La Prairie a small settlement and **“some three settlers”** and if I may say so, if we could see the faces of these men at times they would have a look of incredulity. Can you put yourself in **these men’s shoes coming from a somewhat populated area of the world to this nothingness?**

Regarding Climate they report **“Through what we experienced and otherwise learned, we write in the opinion...”** **No cell phone** applications to advise you of the weather, they had to live through it! Are you still with me?

“A record-breaking number of finalists have been selected for Canada’s largest outdoor sculpture competition in St. Andrews, New Brunswick. Twenty-one finalists have been chosen from all over Canada to compete in the 2012 Canadian Sculpture Competition at Kingsbrae Garden.

“What a nice surprise just before the holiday season,” said Gary Briggs, a selected finalist from Osgoode Ward. “My wife and I will deliver the finished work in June and are planning a holiday in the Kingsbrae Garden area.”

The finalists will be working to complete their sculptures over the next few months. The sculptures will then be shipped or personally delivered to Kingsbrae Garden in

time for the annual awards ceremony being held on June 14, 2012.

The first-prize winning work from the 2012 Competition will find a permanent home on display with the Kingsbrae Sculpture Garden. The second-prize winning work will also be on display at Kingsbrae Garden.

This will be the fourth consecutive year for the Canadian Sculpture Competition held at Kingsbrae Garden, a breathtaking 27 acre public garden featuring more than 50,000 perennials, a rare Wollemi Pine, a sculpture garden, exotic animals, children’s activities, an art gallery and so much more!

Born in LaPrairie across from Montreal on October 16th 1816.

His parents emigrated from Dundee Scotland in 1809.

He was converted under the ministry of Rev. John Gilmore of Montreal.

He attended Hamilton University and spent summer vacation as a Missionary in the back woods of Ontario.

Dr.Fyfe became the first Baptist Minister in Perth where he organized the Church.He then became a pastor in Toronto.

In 1860 he established the Baptist College at Woodstock, known then as the Canadian Literary Institute.

Proposed and participated in the forging of Missions in the 'North West'.

RA Fyfe died at the age 62, in September of 1878.

Recipe Round-up

Apple Barley Pudding

4 Tablespoons Pearl barley
1-1/2 pounds Eating apples*
2 ounces Sugar
3/4 Tablespoon Double cream
1 liter Water

* Peeled, cored and sliced.

Put the barley in the water and bring to the boil. Add the sliced apples and continue cooking gently until the barley and apples are soft. Press through a sieve, or put through the blender, and put back in the saucepan. Add the sugar and lemon juice and bring to the boil again. Remove from the heat, allow to cool, and then chill. Serve cool with the cream stirred in. Servings: 4

About Us

The Osgoode Township Historical Society & Museum traces its founding back to November 23, 1972 when the first meeting to organize "The New Horizons Historical Group" was held. Their purpose in establishing this group was to do research, create interest, collect data, preserve and publish the history of Osgoode Township and the genealogy of its residents.

The initial objective was to prepare a story for the Township of Osgoode's 150th Anniversary in 1977. It was on August 8, 1973 that the founding group signed an agreement with the Township of Osgoode covering the use of the building and property known then as the Vernon Public School. The group held their first meeting in the school on August 23, 1973.

The official opening of the Museum was held on September 21, 1973 with many interesting articles of bygone days on display for the first Visitors' Day. The Agricultural Museum building was subsequently built and officially opened on August 12, 1989. It now provides a home for the vast farming and industrial collection held by the Museum.

The Historical Society continues to collect information and artefacts relating to life in Osgoode Township and make them available to the public.
