Staffing Changes at the Museum

As a result of the ongoing process of re-organization and updating of our staffed position with the Museum, the current position of Curator had become redundant. Work is being done to revamp it as more of a Managerial position to oversee all the many tasks that are carried out on a daily basis by our Museum staff. As a result, our Board of Management has taken on a more active role in the day-to-day operations of the Museum and Jim Stevenson, has moved onto other opportunities. Ann Robinson has taken on a larger Managerial role, until such a time as staff job descriptions are revamped.

Our Assistant Curator, Tara Heft has also moved elsewhere. Her husband accepted a job transfer to another city and province and the commute for Tara would have been murder. Our previous summer student, **Kristie Bredfeldt** (had been Collections Management & Inventory Clerk) has now filled that vacated position. If you have had the opportunity to meet with Kristie or speak to her on the

telephone, you will know that our Museum is in goods hands.

Work is still continuing with the City of Ottawa on a development plan which will outline our direction of the next few years. This plan, which will take a year or more to develop, while allowing us to move toward the future, will and will always reflect our mandate to protect, preserve and promote the rich heritage that is the former Osgoode Township and its families.

The Accessibility Plan is also an ongoing process. It is a Provincially-mandated initiative as well as one which is important to the OTHS to insure access for all. We have already seen improvements to the Museum site with the installation of the new ramp at the front entrance as well as renovated and full-accessible washroom facilities. Additional items being looked at are improved access to the barn as well as increased lighting on Museum grounds, audio assistance for some of our displays as well as translation of materials, where warranted. If there is anything, that you as a member, think should also be considered, please contact a member of the Board of Directors or Museum staff with you suggestion. NOW IS THE TIME TO SPEAK UP!

While our Board of Directors and Staff have been quite busy with the Historical Society and Museums' progression into the future, we always appreciate any extra input or help you can give. Please feel free to contact us with suggestions or come out and visit us.

As a result of research carried out during the preparation of the books "*In Our Defense: The Veterans and Military Heritage of Historic Osgoode Township*", c2007, it was revealed that there were several names missing from the WWI Cenotaph which should be added. The process of having those names added, as well as having the Township Cenotaphs cleaned and restored has begun. An application is being prepared for funding through the Canada Remembers program of Veterans Affairs Canada. Co-Sponsors of this initiative include our Osgoode Township Historical Society, Royal Canadian Legion, Branch #589 (Osgoode), Osgoode Ward Councillor Doug Thompson and Member of Parliament, the Honourable Pierre Poilievre.

It is hoped that the engraving of names and cleaning will be completed in time for November 11 Remembrance Services in 2011.
