AGRICULTURAL MUSEUM BUILDING

The agricultural Museum building shown on the cover page of our 1993 newsletters was officially opened on 12 August, 1989. It was dedicated to the preservation and display of artifacts relating to agriculture and associated industries in Osgoode township from prehistory to the 1930's.

The need for a large building to house such a collection was evident from the early days of the Historical society and the acquisition of the building, the collecting, cleaning, repair and arrangement of artifacts have increased interest in our Society, boosted membership and won the admiration of our many visitors.

As the building began to fill up with artifacts both donated and on loan, steps were taken to create order in the midst of abundance. Interior sheathing for the walls and shelves were installed so that smaller items could be clearly and safely displayed. Artifacts were assembled according to their function and where possible, in a way that shows the development or fabricated to show how items were powered or used. Artifacts are labeled to indicate their use, approximate age, origin and the name of the donor. Photographs demonstrating equipment in use are an especially helpful addition to the display.

The collection includes the following groups of related artifacts:

(a) those representing timber and wood-working tools; they range from axes and peaveys to a treadle operated wood lathe, a gasoline engine powered drag saw, a dug-out canoe and a very early chain saw. (b) land clearing, drainage and cultivation equipment such as a stump and stone puller, tiling tools and many ploughs, cultivators and seeders, some hand made, some locally manufactured.

(c) reaping and mowing equipment, showing the progression from scythes, sickles and grain cradles to threshing mills, winnowing mills and one of the earliest combine-harvesters used in the community. (d) numerous items of dairy equipment, among the most impressive collections to be found in any small museum in Eastern Ontario. (e) a wide variety of other miscellaneous items such as water pumps, gasoline engines, corn shellers, root pulpers, barn and vehicle lanterns, and an extensive maple syrup making exhibit.

The building itself was constructed with grants from the province and township, from local service groups and private individuals. Since its opening, the grounds have been landscaped, a sign made and installed and an eye-catching windmill repaired and erected, as seen on the left side of the newsletter photograph. These improvements, as well as much of the work on the collection itself, have been accomplished by members who have donated their time, materials and considerable skills to the Museum. Their efforts are very much appreciated and add greatly to the work begun here some twenty years ago. As much as the artifact collection itself, the members' knowledge and skills are a priceless historical resource for the community.

These are stories of childhood along the banks of the Castor River in the early years of the century. Many are set in the Osgoode Township, others are about the village of Russell and the area around the boundary between the two great counties of Carleton and Russell. The book covers a wide-range of topics from woodcutting in winter, summer pedlars and threshing bees to the excitement of night fishing and disastrous fires. The stories, like the counties, are bound together by the branches of the Castor River.

Each story looks at history through a child's eyes and has some exciting action that involves the reader. They are particularly suitable for young people. These stories are for family time, for parents and grandparents to read on their own, and especially for elders to read aloud to children.

1901 AND 1871 CENSUS RETURNS

At last the 1901 census has arrived! These eagerly awaited returns have been open to the public at the National Archives since January and our very own microfilm copy, including Osgoode, Gloucester and Russell Townships, is now available for members to consult at the Museum

These returns will help family historians bring their records forward another decade, which can sometimes mean another generation. What is special about the 1901 census though, is the greater detail elicited for each individual. The three most interesting aspects are exact birth dates, the year of immigration for persons originating elsewhere, and the year of naturalization.

The significance of exact birthdates is self-evident, but researchers are reminded that the information should be cross-checked if possible. For the same reasons as in previous census returns, errors may have occurred if someone supplied information for another individual, if a person preferred to conceal his or her exact age (it happens), or, especially for older residents, if memory failed. Indeed, sometimes the year is left blank.

The year of immigration is a real bonus. The information in these returns may be the first official documentation of hazy oral tradition. Bearing in mind the scarcity of early ships' manifests, it may be the only one. The National Archives has passenger lists on microfilm for 1865 through 1919, of which only those from 1865 to 1869 have been indexed. If your ancestor immigrated after 1864, you can now search passenger lists for the specific year (or thereabouts he gave to the enumerator.

The year of naturalization category is rarely filled in for residents of this area because most immigrants to Osgoode Township were British citizens and thus were not required to be naturalized in Canada; often those who were eligible (Americans or Europeans) simply never bothered and this is sometimes indicated with the letters "n.p" for "no papers." However, a year in this column could lead you into an index held by the Citizenship Registration Branch, Secretary of State, in Sydney, Nova Scotia. (Original naturalization records before 1915 were destroyed.)

The enumeration of Osgoode Township consists of some 106 pages of personal returns, broken into 14 Divisions, and lists approximately 5000 residents as of enumeration day, 31 March 1901. Two schedules from the 1901 census returns

were microfilmed: a Schedule of Buildings and Lands, Churches and Schools, shown first for each Division, then a Schedule of Population. Find the listing for the family you are researching in the Schedule of Population and carefully note the page and line numbers. Then go back to the first schedule: the first two columns on the left identify the page and line numbers where each household is listed in the personal return. Although the Schedule of Buildings, etc. does not provide the detail about agricultural livestock and produce that earlier census returns contained, it does identify the lot and concession and the number of acres owned or leased.

For example, on page 4, line 40, Division G11, we find listed John Sullivan, head of household, widowed, born 26 March 1827, age at last birthday, 73, a farmer working on his own account; he was born in Ireland, and immigrated in 1851. His single daughter Ellen, was born in Canada (rural) on 18 February 1860, age 40 on last birthday. His single son Owen, farm labourer, was born in Canada (rural) on 18 March 1863, age 37 on last birthday. Owen was employed for the last 12 months at home, and had earned \$200. All were Roman Catholics and their mother tongue was English. From the Schedule of Buildings, etc., we learn that the family owned and lived on 100 acres of Lot 13, Concession 9; their house of wood had six rooms, and there were three barns, sheds or outbuildings on the property.

Exactly how this information will be made more readily accessible (reader-printer copy, computer printout and/or index) is still being decided. In the meantime, interested members are encouraged to come to the Museum and explore the 1901 census for new details of their own family history.

We have also obtained a copy of the second microfilming of the 1871 census returns for Osgoode Township. In addition to the Nominal Schedules of the Living contained in the early filming, this reel also includes a Nominal Schedule of the Dead (individuals who died in the 12 months prior to enumeration day) for each Division and Agricultural Returns, showing lot and concession numbers. As well, there are schedules for industrial and commercial establishments and information about public institutions, fishing, mineral and forestry products. Just to whet your interest, the only entry on the schedule for mineral products reported that one individual in the West side of the Township thought he had gold on his land. Who was it? And exactly where did he live? Come and see.

FENIAN RAIDERS IN OSGOODE TWP

The assassination of D'Arcy McGee, at the height of his career on April 6, 1868 culminated from events in the spring of 1866 and kept Ottawa in a turmoil with reports of invasions and rumours of civil strife. The source of the unrest was the Fenian Brotherhood, a revolutionary secret society composed of Irish Americans whose aim it was to conquer Canada and make it a base of operations for the liberation of Ireland. The real scare came in June 1 of 1866 when a troop of 800 Fenians under the command of John O'Neill sipped across the Niagara river by boat and landed at Fort Erie. By the time the Canadians rallied and forced retreat, 9 were dead and 44 wounded. Ottawa was ready for further insurrection, the streets were crammed with soldiers. The Carleton Blazers, a sharp shot troop were mobilized at the Drill Shed on Nicholas Street.

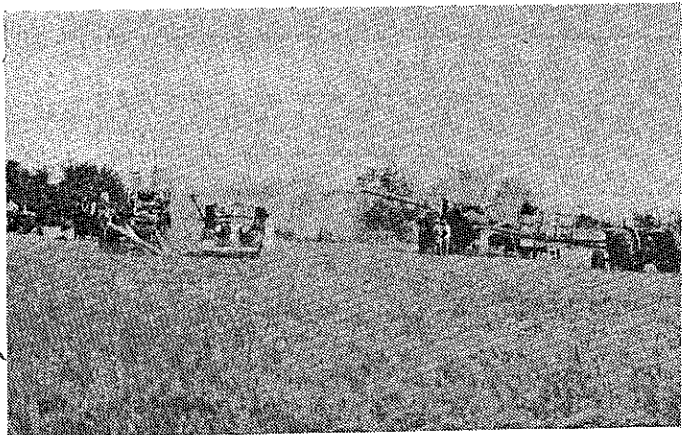

THRESHING ON THE DALGLEISH FARM



This picture depicts an old time threshing operation that took place on the K.M. Dalgleish farm near Kenmore. The aforementioned had retired from dairying a few years previously and was cash cropping in oats and barley. This particular year he had close to 120 acres of crop. It was all bound and stooked when all of a sudden Mr. Dalgleish suffered a heart attack and passed away. The owner had been very proud of his farm that he called "Low Banks Farm" which once boasted an excellent herd of purebred Holstein cattle.

The Castor River lazily flowed through the centre of it providing good drainage for his land. Mr. Dalgleish had only one son, Charlie and a number of daughters. Charlie farmed with his father as a young man, but he wanted to be a mechanic and the lure of (Motor City) Detroit coaxed him away from the farm. Charlie became very successful working with cars. He later became a respected Nash dealer, then when those automobiles ceased production, he went to General Motors products and became Detroit's largest Cadillac dealer. Those who knew him often noticed the big cigar he carried in his fingers (just for show) because the man never smoked in his life.

It is no wonder Charlie was successful because he certainly was an organizer. Shortly after his father's funeral, Charlie had the responsibility of getting his grain all threshed and sold. He hired Russell Eastman and his son Mervyn with their two big threshing mills and things got underway. All the neighbours turned out plus Charlie hired all the available men he could get, which was quite a few. All told, there was around 40 of us helping to thresh his crop. Kenneth Dalgleish died September 20, 1952.

Just a little piece of past history, where would you ever get that many men today at a threshing? I was pleased to be part of it. This farm today is owned by the Melonhorst Brothers of Kenmore and is a highly productive part of their operation as dairy farmers.
